Hope for Sinners Who Trust the Lord, Warning for Rebels Who Don't

Numbers 15-16

I. Hope for Sinners Who Trust the Lord (Numbers 15:1-29)

- A. Hope that God is faithful to his promises (15:1-21)
 - 1. In light of the last chapter, things are looking bleak (Num. 14:42-45)
 - 2. But note the hope of the sacrifices and the "when you come into the land" comments (15:2, 18).
- B. Hope that God is a forgiving God (15:22-29)
 - 1. Unintentionally Distinct from "high handed" (cf. Num. 15:30)
 - 2. "Atonement" and "shall be forgiven." So, there is hope for sinners who are trusting the Lord.

II. Warnings for Rebels (Numbers 15:30-41)

- A. High-handed Sin (15:30-36)
 - 1. Despising the Word of the Lord (rather than trusting) leads to high handed sin.
 - 2. An example of one committing a high handed sin (15:32-36)
 - 3. Warning for us "Take care, brothers, lest there be in any of you an evil, unbelieving heart, leading you to fall away from the living God" (Heb. 3:12).
- B. Remember God's Commandments and Be Holy (Num. 15:37-41)
 - 1. Here they are warned and challenged to prevent high-handed sin by remembering God's commands and holiness.
 - 2. The tassels remind them– Don't follow your own heart and eyes.

 - 1. We see a true priest doing what a priest does interceding, making atonement.
 - 2. So, what happens if we approach God our own way, thinking we can be our own priest?

IV. How This Points to Jesus

- A. Jesus stands between the living and the dead (Num. 16:48; 1 Cor. 15:54-57)
- B. Do not reject the one the Lord has anointed Jesus (Num 16:2, 11; Psalm 2).
